Muriel Stephenson A life led with faith



For many, 102 years is a lifetime of quiet chapters. For Muriel Stephenson it has been a story filled with music, faith and service. One lived with a violin in hand and a Bible close by.



Muriel moved into St. Joseph's Lifecare Centre in August bringing with her a legacy shaped by more than three decades of missionary work in India. From 1952 until 1987 she dedicated her life to children and education, often traveling alone across the country by train to reach new communities. She ran a girls' school in Ratlam, taught

music and helped lead worship services, always guided by her faith. "I live as the Lord leads me," she says.

A life in India

Muriel's time overseas brought no shortage of stories, some harrowing and some joyful. She recalls once coming home to find a poisonous snake in her house and dispatching it with the heel of her shoe. On another occasion she sought refuge under a seat on an overcrowded overnight train, finding rest wherever she could.

Music was constant. Born into a musical family in Ontario that included her older sister Norma and twin sister Isobel who were both music teachers, and brother Ken, Muriel grew up playing violin often joining in hymn-singing around the piano. In India she carried


her instrument

Poet of faith

When Muriel returned to Canada she continued serving in her own way. She wrote several books of poetry, including an autobiography titled *Rainbow of Joy*. For years she shared daily poems that set Bible verses to verse form, mailing and later emailing them to friends and family across the world. This quiet ministry became her way of nurturing community and faith in her retirement. Her nephew George and nieces Shirley and Mary remember how faithfully she kept at it. "It was inspiring to see her faith," George said. "She lives it day to day."





Strength, independence and grace

Muriel never married, preferring to chart her own path. She is remembered as independent, outspoken and kind, a woman who led by example rather than by preaching. At George's wedding she came out of violin retirement just long enough to play *Amazing Grace* and *What a Friend We Have in Jesus*, making the small ceremony during COVID restrictions all the more meaningful.

She is also remembered for her motto: "Life goes on and we go with it."

Today, though she no longer walks as freely as she once did, Muriel still brightens every visit with a smile and a warm welcome. Her Bible is always close at hand and her joy comes from her faith, her family and her many friends both near and far.
