Maguire family to hike in memory of Mom

or many of the individuals and families who participate in Hike for Hospice each year, behind the decision to take part is a story of hope, struggle, loss and inspiration. Count the Maguire family among them.

The last thing Catherine, Michelle and Andrew Maguire were expecting to hear back in 2014 was that their 50-year-old mother had cancer. At the time, Catherine was 23,

Michelle, 21 and Andrew, 19.

To her children, Deborah (Maguire) Armstrong, was a vital, spirited lady, with a great sense of humour, adored by all who knew her. After undergoing a complete hysterectomy in 2014 which included the removal of a lowgrade endometrial stromal sarcoma, Deborah was declared cancer-free. and she went on with the business of living her life.

Three years later, in August of 2017, a pain in her abdomen led to a CT scan that identified a tumour, significantly larger than the first. Deborah began treatment but by

January 2018 it was determined the tumour had become larger and had metastasized. Her prognosis was poor.

Deborah spent a number of months in palliative care at the hospital before going home, where she received care from Stedman Community Hospice's Outreach team for six weeks, before moving into the residential hospice on Grey Street.

"I still lived at home at the time,"

says Andrew.

"My mom's greatest fear was that I would come home and find her. That was a big part of her decision to end outreach care and go to the residential hospice," says Andrew.

While in Hospice and having the benefit of 24-hour care, the staff was able to monitor Deborah's reaction to pain medication and adjustments were made to increase her alertness so the family could enjoy more

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quality time together, and still manage her pain.

"Being at the Hospice made a real difference for us," says Andrew.

"Quite often I'd be visiting her whenever I got the chance, sometimes on my lunch hour and again at the end of the day. Unlike when she was receiving palliative care in hospital, it was wonderful to not have to worry about parking expenses when you are visiting two or three times a day. Also, the Hospice always had a pot of soup on for families and sometimes I'd be arriving at the end of the day, hardly stopping to eat through the day. Those little things made it possible for you to spend your free time with her," he shared.

"Mom absolutely loved being in the gardens at the Hospice," says Andrew.

"Going outside and being wheeled through the gardens was a highlight of her day. She even had a favourite bench she'd like to stop at."

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The month of May 2018 was an eventful and emotional time for the Maguire family.

When Michelle held her bridal shower on May 6, Deborah was able to attend virtually from the Hospice with Andrew by her side, managing the technology.

Soon after, the family celebrated Mother's Day.

"Our mom was a dessert lover, so on Mother's Day we brought her two cakes in case she wanted to have one

all for herself," chuckled Catherine.

The three siblings recall being at the Hospice on May 7 when Hike for Hospice took place and seeing the hundreds of participants walking along the route, past the Hospice, in their Hike t-shirts. The following year they would be walking that route themselves, along with several family members and friends.

On May 12, Michelle held her wedding on the grounds of Stedman Community Hospice, in the presence of her mother, as well as her father, stepfather, stepmother and several close friends and family.

"My original wedding date was June 23 but I knew if I didn't change the date, my mom would not get to see me in the dress she had bought for me," says Michelle.

"It would be the only opportunity for her to see one of her three children walk down the aisle since I was the first of her kids to get married," Michelle added.

It was a wise decision; Deborah passed away on June 7 with her husband and children by her side.

This year, on May 15, the Maguire family will once again honour their mother's life by participating in Hike for Hospice, an annual fundraiser in support of Stedman Community Hospice.

"Because of Stedman Community Hospice our mom was able to die with dignity and we were able to focus on just being by her side," says Catherine.

"We want to make sure other families are able to receive the same care and we're hoping for a great turnout."
