Born with a neurological degenerative disorder, Charlotte was not expected to survive past the age of eight months. After years of being cared for at home by her parents, Jessica and Jeremy Stewart of St. George, Charlotte joined our Hospice family in the summer of 2017. During her time with us, Charlotte's beauty illuminated our halls and brightened the hearts of everyone who surrounded her. Charlotte's Aunt, Cara Overduin, shared with us the family's experience with Charlotte at Stedman Community Hospice.



"Initially, we were apprehensive, but that apprehension turned quickly to a flood of relief. Thanks to the amazing team of nurses and personal support workers, as well as the peaceful atmosphere at the Hospice, Charlotte was so at ease. We had never seen her more comfortable or calm. It gave us such a sense of relief to just be able to be with her as a family, celebrating the joy of having her in our lives. We are so thankful."

CHASING THE LIGHT

For months, my Mom, 71 year old Marilyn, a loving mother, wife and humanitarian, battled with unexplained illness. As my family and I endeavoured to care for her at home, my coping mechanism was painting. 'Chasing the Light' (see photo, right) was initially inspired by the idea that we (and my Mom) were chasing the light of hope through the darkness we were experiencing. After a CT Scan revealed that my Mom had cancer throughout her body and bones, the truth revealed itself. She was going to die. 'Chasing the Light' now steered toward my mother chasing the light to the other side.

Though our hearts burned with sadness at the thought of losing her, something amazing happened when my Mom was admitted to Stedman Community Hospice. Thanks to the generosity and compassion of every single donor who supports the Hospice, my mother was finally able to breathe fresh air, feel the heat of the sun, watch the clouds, spend time in the beautiful gardens and sleep in peace and quiet. Each step of her journey was approached carefully and lovingly by the highly experienced nurses, doctors and support workers; in particular, our 'earth angel', Registered Nurse, Tara Young. It was a great relief to our family that she would be taken care of with compassion and truth. It calmed our hearts and minds that she would pass with dignity, peace and love.

The day my mother died was surreal. Intense emotions welled up inside me and I had to let it all out. Devastated, but determined, I drove to my art studio in Toronto and painted my heart out. I sat in front of the blank canvas (see photo, below) reflecting on all that had happened, and contemplated what I would paint. I thought about her life, my relationship with her and how lucky I was to have such an amazing mother. As I poured the colours, my intuition moved them across the canvas. I felt peace knowing that my mother was with me in spirit, watching me and guiding me. The painting, which now hangs in my home is a constant reminder that my mother is always with me. The title of the piece (see completed painting, below) is 'Freedom & Light' which is what my Mom now has on the other side.

Stedman Community Hospice was the ultimate blessing and we will never forget the compassion that lives in the hearts of all the people that work and volunteer there. We are forever grateful to the people who so generously donate to the Hospice so that people, like my mother, may die with the dignity and peace they deserve. Thank you.
